elevated one. Having
recently been elected as
a selectman, Laliberte
was acutely aware of the

overwhelming support of the Candia community to send students to Pinkerton and was glad to be a part of it.

"Candia voted pretty extensively by 90 or 91% to move to Pinkerton in 2016. As someone who grew up in Candia, I knew there was a real desire to go to Pinkerton for the students," he says. "So for me, it was exciting to be a part of that process, especially because my wife and I were in the process of fostering our two children who we have since adopted. They're 10 and 9, and knowing they'll be going to Pinkerton, it felt like good synergy." Laliberte has served in various leadership roles within the Board, including Secretary since 2021 and Chair of the Buildings and Grounds Committee since 2022. He previously led the Advancement Committee, demonstrating his commitment to supporting the school's growth and development. He credits the varied

experience of the Trustees in providing a vision for Pinkerton's continued tradition of excellence.

"What I found immediately after joining [the Board] was that the conversation was very elevated," he says. "You have to be on your game. To contribute you have to be learning, which I find very exciting. Everyone has this expertise they bring to the table to contribute to the future of the school."

Professionally, Laliberte works for the New Hampshire Department of Business and Economic Affairs, where he focuses on attracting businesses to the state. This experience brings valuable insights to his role as a Trustee, particularly in areas related to economic development and community partnerships. As a local native who did not attend Pinkerton, he believes he also offers a unique perspective on the school.

"I always said those of us who didn't go to Pinkerton looked at it with a different lens. At my high school, the spirit wasn't really there," he admits. "Then coming into Pinkerton, there is a spirit that sticks with you beyond commencement."

Laliberte believes much of that spirit is rooted in the deep pride that resonates at Pinkerton and how it seeks to provide all students with paths to success.

"Pinkerton is a community. There's pride in various elements of the Academy: the academics, the athletics, the arts. You have pride in what you do for non-traditional students, pride for the CTE program, pride for the Freshman Academy," he says. "There's a real effort to think about how do we engage students in a very big school in various paths for their

success. Pinkerton legitimately looks at the individual student and provides pathways for each to succeed."

Laliberte lives in Candia with his wife Patti and their two children Emilie and Jared. In his free time he enjoys reading and the many elements of parenting two young children.

Cathy McKay, a familiar face in the Londonderry community, has dedicated her career to helping families navigate the complexities of divorce and family law. McKay's journey to law began unexpectedly. While attending Pinkerton Academy, one of her classes included a job shadowing opportunity that sparked an interest. She shadowed local attorney Bruce Dorner, and the experience proved to

"I remember being fascinated by the process," she recalls. "Seeing how the law could be used to help people resolve disputes and navigate complex situations was incredibly rewarding."

Following graduation in 1983, McKay attended the University of New Hampshire, majoring in business as a potential "fallback" plan. However, her interest in law grew into a passion, and she went on to attend the New England School of Law in Boston at night. While still a student, she began working at her current law firm, starting with simple tasks like purging old files.

"Even those seemingly mundane tasks were valuable," she explains. "They gave me a deeper understanding of how the legal system works and the importance of attention to detail."

Beyond practicing law, McKay is active in the greater community, serving as the current Chair of the Greater Derry Londonderry Chamber of Commerce. She also sits on the Board of Collaborative Divorce New Hampshire and is active with the NH Women's Bar Association.

In her downtime, McKay enjoys spending time with her family. She and her husband Kevin McKay '81 have two children: Dillon and Marissa. She and Kevin enjoy golf and are regulars at Pinkerton's Alumni Golf Tournament. They live in Londonderry with their "goofy mutt" Latte.

Reflecting on her time at Pinkerton, Cathy acknowledges the initial adjustment to the larger environment after coming from a smaller school. However, she encourages current students to embrace the diverse opportunities that Pinkerton offers.

"Keep an open mind," she advises, "and explore different areas of study. You never know where your passions might lead."

Brian Balke, a 1990 graduate of Pinkerton Academy, continues a family tradition of educational leadership. As the superintendent of SAU 19 (Goffstown and New Boston), he marks the third generation of superintendents in his family.

"I consider it an honor to be a leader and an advocate for public education," he says. "It's a value shared through those generations. My uncle and grandfather were public school superintendents, and my mother was a public school teacher as well."

This love of education might have first been sparked in Balke during his time at Pinkerton. Reflecting on his high school experience, he particularly remembers appreciating the diverse student body.

"Coming from Windham, I loved meeting kids from other towns and having the opportunity to leave a small school and spread my wings," he shares.

He credits Mr. Burnham as one of his most influential teachers, instilling a passion for current events and political issues. "Mr. Burnham taught me to pay attention and care about the world around me."

Balke and his wife, Rebecca (Shok), also a 1990 Pinkerton graduate, met during their junior year in Spanish class, though they didn't date until college. Both went on to attend the University of New Hampshire, where Balke earned a degree in earth science teaching.

Following his time at UNH, Balke embarked on a career in education, serving in various roles across the state. Spending time as Assistant Special

Education Director in Derry gave him a unique perspective on his alma mater, and he holds a deep appreciation for the educational opportunities offered by Pinkerton Academy.

Hamilton spent her high school years at Pinkerton exploring a variety of activities and classes. She played field hockey, served as a class officer and a student council representative, and explored a range of academic interests.

After graduating, Hamilton earned a

degree in social sciences at Hofstra University, focusing on psychology. This led to a career in youth services, where she worked with court-involved youth through programs like the Key Program. These experiences provided valuable insights into the challenges faced by young people and the importance of providing support and guidance. The more experience she gained, the more clear it became to her that she wanted to work with young people.

"I have always wanted to be there to help young people understand that even when things are hard, there's always good. Let's look at that," she says. "Let's focus on strengths. Let's help students see that they can do better, be better, be who they want to be."

Driven by a desire to make a more direct impact on the educational experience of young people, Hamilton decided to pursue a career in education. She earned a master's degree in education and school counseling, preparing her for a new chapter in her career. As Pinkerton's 504 Coordinator, Hamilton works closely with students to ensure they have the accommodations they need to succeed academically.

"My role involves overseeing 485 students with 504 plans, but I really try to stay under the

radar," she explains. "To me, it's about empowering students to understand their unique needs and advocate for the resources they need to succeed. It's empowering them and also the teachers to support them."

Hamilton says that Pinkerton's opportunities and people make it truly special, and she encourages current students to explore their interests, embrace challenges, and be open to new opportunities.

"There's just so much here for everyone," she says. "Try new things, meet new people, and don't be afraid to ask for help. There are so many great people who care about the students and the community — and don't compare yourself to others! Everyone's journey is their own."

ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT

ROBERT GLADYSZ '11

Robert Gladysz, a 2011 graduate of Pinkerton
Academy, has carved a unique path in service to his country and community. His journey, shaped by influential teachers and a profound sense of duty, led him from the halls of Pinkerton to the battlefields of Afghanistan and ultimately to the streets of San Diego.

"I have fond memories of my time at Pinkerton," Gladysz recalls. "Mr. Carnevale, my social studies teacher, really sparked my

interest in the world and how it works. And Mr. Clark's physical fitness class, well, that definitely prepared me for the rigors of the Marine Corps!"

A pivotal influence on his path was his close friend, Michael Geary '09. "[Michael] was one of my best friends," Gladysz shares. "He actually brought me to the Marine Corps recruiting office when I was a sophomore. He essentially propelled me to where I am now. Sadly, Michael was killed in action in 2010."

This tragic loss deeply impacted Gladysz deeply. "Whether it was during boot camp, my own deployment to Afghanistan, or becoming a police officer, my goal was to become at least half the man Mike was," he says. "I owe so much of where I am today to him. His memory is a driving force for me every day I put on my uniform."

Following graduation, Gladysz enlisted in the Marine Corps, eager to serve his country. His military service spanned a decade, including a deployment to Afghanistan in 2013. He also served tours in Kuwait and California, gaining invaluable experience and forging lifelong bonds with his fellow Marines.

In 2021, after a decade of honorable service, he transitioned to civilian life. Following his wife, Ginelle, a San Diego native, he settled in the sunny city and embarked on a new chapter in his service journey as a member of the San Diego Police Department.

A rescue operation in January of 2024 clearly illustrates his belief in the call to protect and serve. Flash flooding had ravaged San Diego, leaving residents trapped in their homes. Gladysz was on route to another call when he noticed a riverbed had flooded and that residents of a nearby apartment complex were standing chest-deep in water, holding hands and trying to get out of the water.

"I just pulled over, got in the water, and started pulling people out. And then I realized some people were actually trapped in their apartments because it was like a swift current from the river," he said. "There was a lot of force in the water, so if you let go, there was a good chance you would be swept downstream. These people's doors couldn't open because of how much pressure was on them from the water. We had to start breaking windows and improvising."

Gladysz is credited with saving 6 people and 4 dogs that day. Reflecting on the experience, he expresses the profound sense of satisfaction that comes with helping others in their time of need.

"I patrol that area still to this day. I was on a radio call there for something unrelated, and there was a crowd of people outside, and they recognized me. They said, 'Hey, you were the officer that was here that day.' It's incredibly rewarding to be able to serve my community and make a positive impact on people's lives," he said.

Beyond the daily duties of a police officer, Gladysz enjoys life at Imperial Beach and serving the southeastern division of San Diego. When asked what message he hopes to convey to current Pinkerton students, he advises, "Explore your interests, try new things, and don't be afraid to step outside your comfort zone. Build a strong foundation through diverse experiences, and never lose sight of the importance of helping others."

Restored Shepard Portrait Unveiling was A-OK

On Monday, November 18, Pinkerton Academy celebrated the 101st anniversary of the birth of its most famous alumnus, Alan Shepard (Class of 1940, Hall of Fame 1990, Trustee 1972–77).

School historian Mark Mastromarino had organized a program around the unveiling of the Academy's restored oil portrait of America's first man in space painted by New York artist Robert Bruce Stevenson. Alan's uncle Frederick J. Shepard Jr., then President of the Board of Trustees, donated it to the school in June 1962 on behalf of the Shepard Family.

To inspire students with Shepard's heroism, the portrait will soon be hung in a new site in the Shepard Building busier than the Sophomore office from which it was removed last spring for professional cleaning and touch up by Northeast Painting Conservation of York, Maine.

Col. Anna Sullivan (Class of 2025) had the honor of performing the actual unveiling. The program concluded with closing remarks by Head of School Dr. Timothy Powers, after which attendees enjoyed refreshments provided by Chef Keith Desjardin and his Culinary Arts students and listened to music played by Declan Collins (Class of 2026) while they socialized and viewed a special exhibit on Alan and the Shepard Family.

HALL OF FAME AND MERITORIOUS SERVICE HONOREES 2024

On Thursday, September 26, 2024, Walter Adams and Lindsay Moran joined the ranks of over 200 other Pinkerton Academy Hall of Fame members, and Bill Newcomb received the Trustees' Meritorious Service Award. Students from the Leadership Council of Athletics were the emcees for the night, and students from the Pinkerton Jazz Combo provided musical entertainment.

William (Bill) Newcomb was awarded the Trustees' Meritorious Service Award. This prestigious award recognizes those individuals who have given admirable service to Pinkerton Academy's student-centered mission. Recipients have demonstrated their commitment to the Academy's core values of courtesy, respect and responsibility—while working as an integral part of the Pinkerton family to advance interactive and relevant learning opportunities for all students.

Newcomb retired from the Board of Trustees in 2023 after devoting 36 years to Pinkerton Academy. During that time he served on several Board committees and chaired the Buildings & Grounds Committee for many of those years. A proud alum, Newcomb's wife and children all graduated from Pinkerton, and all are members of the Hall of Fame. His dedication and commitment to Pinkerton Academy's mission, faculty, staff, and students is unparalled.

Walter Adams - Walter attended Pinkerton from 1887 to 1889. He made significant astronomical discoveries as the director of the Mount Wilson Observatory and developed the method of spectroscopic parallaxes. During WWII he helped produce improved prisms and optics for binoculars and gun sights. Walter received numerous international awards and recognitions for his contributions to astronomy, including honorary doctorates, and memberships in the British Royal Astronomical Society, the British Royal Society, the Royal Swedish Academy, the Institut de France, the U.S. National Academy of Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society. He had an asteroid, as well as craters on Mars and the Moon, named after him.

Lindsay Moran - In 2021 Lindsay retired from Pinkerton Academy as Associate Head of Academics, Physical Education after thirty-four years of service. During her tenure at Pinkerton, she developed the department's curriculum and started the Academy's gymnastics program, which under her leadership won eight state championships, was runner-up twelve times, and won the New England State title twice. Lindsay was also the 2003 Co-Class Advisor, chairperson for the PAWS committee, a FAC committee member, and was a presenter at AHPERD. Lindsay's dedication extended beyond Pinkerton Academy. She taught Physical Education and Health at American International School in Jeddah, introducing students to dance and aerobics, and was on the NHIAA gymnastics committee for nineteen years. Lindsay was recognized with the Shepard Award. Additionally, she received the Governor's Council on Physical Activity and Health's Kathleen Sherman Wellness Award in 2019.

Pinkerton Academy's AFJROTC Corps of Cadets Prove Their Excellence in Annual Inspection

Pinkerton Academy's Junior Reserve Officers' Training Corps (JROTC) closed out the end of the year with an "Exceeds Standards" on their annual inspection. Everyone from the freshman flights to the Top 4 demonstrated amazing effort and dedication during the inspection, earning the Corps an overall score of 98.5, the Air Force's highest possible rating.

Col (Ret) Gina Humble from HQ Air Force JROTC, Maxwell AFB, AL conducted the assessment. She assessed and rated the unit across five categories: Compliance to Standards, Safety and Welfare, Cadet Operations, Instructors, and Special Interest Items. Col Humble performed an open ranks inspection of all the Cadets and spoke to each individually about their JROTC experience. She

observed the Drill Team perform a near perfect demonstration and then led the Corps through a teambuilding exercise to close the assessment. The Corps of Cadets were rated "Exceeds Standards" on all five of their individual inspection items showing their months of dedication and hard work.

A PINKERTON LOVE STORY: THE LEO J. & EVA R. BOUSQUET SCHOLARSHIPS

relatively select few of Pinkerton seniors and alumni have participated in a springtime tradition for the last twenty-five years. Members of the Bousquet Scholarship Committee interview candidates who made the final round of the Bousquet Scholarships competition. The Leo J. & Eva R. Bousquet Scholarships were established at Pinkerton Academy in 1998 to provide financial assistance to graduating Pinkerton seniors attending college or university who have during their years at the Academy demonstrated strong school spirit, exemplary service, proven leadership, and extracurricular participation. The scholarships were established through a trust created by Eva Augusta Richardson Bousquet (born April 20, 1914; Class of 1932) of Seminole, Florida, in her 1989 will. Pinkerton officials were informed of the legacy by the executor of her estate after she passed away on November 12, 1997, and after her estate was settled on December 11, 1997. It was the first they had heard of it. Except for her diamond ring and \$15,000 bequeathed to a second cousin in the final codicil to her will, Eva's estate was entrusted to Pinkerton Academy for the establishment of a permanent scholarship fund, the interest of which would be distributed to worthy graduating seniors to aid in the expense of attending college. The will stated that "The scholarships are to be awarded in the names of Leo J. and Eva R. Bousquet" and "The Academy shall have complete discretion as to the recipients and amount of said scholarships." The Alumni Association was informed by Eva's lawyers on March 3, 1998, that the money in the scholarship trust was estimated to be \$300,000. The annual interest originally amounted to around \$12,500.

Leo Bousquet and Eva Augusta Richardson both attended Pinkerton Academy in the late 1920s and early 1930s. According to the 1920 U.S. Census, Eva was the five-year-old daughter of Harold Myron Richardson (1895–1974) and Cecille V. Campbell Richardson (1891–1973), who lived on Pillsbury Street in Derry. The couple had been married in June 1913 in Haverhill, Mass., but had separated by 1930 (Cecille is listed as divorced in the 1950 Census and living with her own mother, Eva Campbell, in Haverhill, Mass.; but in 1933–34 she lived alone in an apartment on Beech Street in Manchester). In 1930, "Little Eva" (her nickname given in her senior profile in the 1932 Commencement

issue of the *Pinkerton Critic*) lived at 78 Broadway in Derry with Myron Richardson (1864–1933) and Augusta Ruany Nutt Richardson (1866–1939), her paternal grandparents. Her father, Harold Myron Richardson, was a fifty-five-year-old factory worker in Derry when he remarried in 1950. Confusingly, that Certificate of Intention of Marriage stated that he was "Widowed." Also interesting, he is buried in Forest Hill Cemetery in East Derry not with that second wife, Agnes Harriet Simpson Richardson, but with another wife, Gertrude J. McCarthy Richardson.

But back to Eva at Pinkerton. She was an honors student enrolled in the Commercial Curriculum. She played on the girls basketball team for three years and acted in the Junior and Senior plays. She played Grandma Josie Jones in the Junior Class's April 10, 1931, production of Harris Mobley's *Better Than Gold*, a "startling melodrama of the Blue Ridge Mountains." In the Senior Class's January 29, 1932, production of *Yimmie Yonson's Yob*, she was "Kitty the Helper."

Eva also won first prize on June 17, 1931, in the Junior Declamation contest for her presentation of Jessie D. Stockton's "The Busy Body." She was a member of the Literary Club her Senior year and compiled the Class Statistics for the Senior Class, which she presented during Class Day Exercises on June 15, 1932. She graduated with thirty-four other Seniors on June 16, 1932.

According to the 1930 U.S. Census, Leonel Joseph Bousquet (born March 5, 1911) lived at 8 1/2 West Broadway (several blocks away from Eva) with his father, Elphege Bousquet (1882–1953), who owned and ran a lunchroom on Broadway in Derry since 1916; his mother, Laura Auger Bousquet, who had immigrated from Canada in 1900 and ran the lunchroom until her death in 1954; and two younger brothers, sixteen-year-old Arve or Harvey, who inherited the lunchroom, and thirteen-year-old Raymond. Leo was enrolled at Pinkerton as a Freshman in 1925 and graduated with the Class of 1929.

Leo, or "Biscuit" as he was also known, apparently was a bookish young man (Grace Parshley in the June 1929 Commencement issue of the Pinkerton Critic stated his initials stood for "Likes Just Books," and his World War II draft registration card noted in October 1940 that he wore eyeglasses. Unfortunately, The Critic did not publish senior portraits until 1932). He was enrolled in the Commercial Curriculum, making the Honor Roll his Senior year by getting A's in his main classes of Bookkeeping, Commercial Law, and Typewriting. He acted in the Senior Play, Lost, A Chaperone, which was performed on March 22, 1929, in the Adams Memorial Building. He also wrote the Class History for the Class of 1929. On June 19, 1929, he graduated with sixty-two other classmates, four months before the Great Wall Street Stock Market Crash.

After graduating, Leo left Derry, a town on 5,131 people in 1930, for the big city of Springfield, Mass. (population, 149,900), where he attended Bay Path

Institute. Bay Path was one of the largest and most successful New England business schools in the 1920s, well-known for its strong academic programs in business management, accounting, and finance. After graduating from Bay Path, Leo studied accounting and management at Springfield's Northeastern University (later Western New England College). He apparently supported himself while in college, not an easy thing to do in the early years of the Great Depression.

Leo and Eva became acquainted, or reacquainted, in Manchester, N.H. It has not been determined if Eva and Leo made their separate ways to the Queen City and reconnected there. At Pinkerton, only his senior year overlapped with her freshman year, so it is not known how much they socialized while there. His younger brother Raymond (Class of 1934), who was closer in age to Eva than Leo was, might have known her better. But romance must have blossomed sometime, somewhere. As stated on their marriage certificate, both Leo and Eva were living in Manchester when they were married there on March 30, 1934, by the Reverend James F. English of the First Congregational Church at Hanover and Union streets. That record stated that she was employed as a clerk and he as a cook, a skill he had learned at his family's restaurant. The 1935 Manchester City Directory listed the newlyweds as living in an apartment at 1317 Elm Street and noted that Leo worked as a cook for Adrien Pinsince at Andrew's Lunch at 1273 Elm.

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Bousquet did not stav long in Manchester. Some time before June 1936, the newlyweds had moved to Springfield, when Leo was hired as a member of the Cost Department of the C. F. Church Manufacturing Company in nearby Chicopee. The 1940 U.S. Census had them living in Chicopee, but in the 1950 one they were living in Monson. Eva's mother had not vet moved in with them by either year, and neither census listed any children. In 1948 Leo became Office Manager of the company's Molding Division and was soon promoted to an assistant manager at the firm. In 1952 he was elected Assistant Treasurer of the company (*Derry* News, November 6, 1952).

The couple removed to Florida in 1974, apparently after Leo retired. What little else has been discovered about their later years appeared in his obituary published in the Holyoke, Mass., *Transcript-Telegram* on

Wednesday, March 15, 1989. By then he was a member of the First United Methodist Church in Largo, Pinellas County, Fla., the fourth largest city in the Tampa Bay area. The obituary noticed that memorial contributions could be made to the church, and perhaps he left some money to it in his will. Although Eva had died in Clearwater, Florida, according to her obituary in the *Derry News* on December 12, 1997, it is telling that Reverend Brian Wood of Derry's St. Luke's United Methodist Church offered committal services on December 4, in Forest Hill Cemetery, East Derry. For the couple's remains came home from Florida and rest in their shared grave in Section 11. As in life, thus in death.

Obviously, then, Eva and Leo never stopped thinking of Derry as their home. And they were reminded that Pinkerton was a treasured part of that home by an event that had occurred four years before Leo's death. The couple attended the Alumni Association's first Florida Reunion held at Philippe Park in Safety Harbor, Florida, on Sunday, February 24, 1985, just twenty-five minutes away from Largo. Who knows what conversations they had that day with their seventysix fellow alumni, twenty-four of whom had graduated, like them, in the 1920s and early 1930s. Being with Pinkerton folk undoubtedly elicited memories of their alma mater and might have planted the seed that would later blossom into the Bousquet Scholarships. Leo never attended another Florida reunion, and no evidence has been found documenting Eva's attendance without him. The only other contact I have uncovered of Eva with Pinkerton before the school was notified by the executor of her estate in 1998, was in the winter of 1992. She wrote to the Alumni Office to say how much she liked the Alumnus: "I enjoy receiving it and learning of the tremendous growth that Pinkerton has made in the years since I left there" (Alumnus, 14, no. 3 [Winter 1992], p. 2).

There were no clues in Eva's will as to her decision. We can only assume that she and her husband discussed the trust before his death at the age of seventy-eight in March 1989, three and a half months before she signed her will. Leo, the financial wiz, undoubtedly handled the couple's finances himself, and that most scrupulously, as befitted the past president of the Springfield chapter of the International Cost Accountants Association (which became the Institute of Management Accountants in 1991). He probably also drafted her will with legal assistance. The facts that they never had children of their own, that Eva's mother, who had lived with them in Springfield for two years, after her retirement and before her death in January 1973, and that they had no close relatives that survived them, influenced their decision to leave a generous legacy to Pinkerton Academy.

For a quarter of a century, Pinkerton has disbursed over a quarter of a million dollars to more than sixty students as Bousquet Scholarships. More importantly, it has carefully tended the original gift to ensure that the scholarships will continue to be awarded into the future, memorializing Leo's fiscal acumen and his and Eva's generosity. The Bousquet name, and now their story, will long be remembered and honored, and not just by the direct beneficiaries, the Bousquet Scholars. All of Pinkerton—past, present, and future—benefits from the reminder that extraordinary acts of appreciation and generosity by ordinary people help perpetuate Pinkerton Academy's institutional mission of building, with courtesy, respect, and responsibility, an inclusive educational community that prepares all its diverse students for future success.

LOCAL BUSINESS HOSTS STUDENT ART SHOW








Bert Deivert has been busy getting back on the "blues" road. He had tongue and throat cancer treatment last year and


